

## Sung Compline

The Choir will sing the service of Compline to mark St Peter's Day at 9.15pm **this Wednesday, 29th June.**

Lasting about 20 minutes, this is an evocative, moving service in the half light of the church at night.

## New Congregational setting

This month we are learning the St Mary's Communion Setting by Revd Anthony Caesar for regular use here at Melbourne. Last Sunday we sang the Sanctus, Benedictus & Agnus Dei for the first time, having practised it before the service. At the beginning of the 10.30 service today, the Choir and I will introduce us to the Gloria before we sing it later on in the service. There is a Congregational edition of the music available which we shall use to help learn it and which will be available each week we sing it too.

Anthony Caesar was Subdean of the Chapels Royal from 1979 to 1991, having previously been Canon Precentor and Vice-Dean of Winchester Cathedral. During this period he was also the music editor of our hymnbook, the New English Hymnal. In the 1991 Queen's Birthday Honours he was promoted to Commander of the Royal Victorian Order (CVO).

## Melbourne Mothers' Union

We held our annual Coffee Evening on Tuesday 7 June, and as usual were well supported, not only by our own church, but by ladies from other churches in Melbourne. It was a lovely sunny evening and our guests were able to enjoy time in the rectory garden. A total of £182 was raised which will go towards MU work overseas such as literacy programmes, parenting courses and community projects. Thank you to all who supported us.

Last month our speaker was from Safe and Sound in Derby. The Mothers' Union has supported this organisation for many years as it works to rescue and support young people who have been groomed and exploited for sexual purposes. Unfortunately the need to tackle this problem has grown and the organisation now has four caseworkers working in one-to-one relationships with the victims and their families, supporting them through police investigations. It also has a transition worker for 18-25 age group so that support doesn't suddenly stop when adulthood is reached. Another team of workers speaks to outside organisations locally and beyond county borders to raise awareness of child exploitation so it can be dealt with in the early stages. Our branch presented the speaker with a cheque for £100 raised by members over the past few months.

The next meeting is on July 5th, and as it is joint with our friends from Ticknall, will be held in the Senior Citizens' Centre at 2.00 pm. The speaker is from the Whistlewood Common project and any one who would like to come to hear more about its development will be most welcome. *Ruth Smith*

### **The Readings at 8am and 10.30am:**

**The First Reading:** *Galatians 5. 1,13-25*

For freedom Christ has set us free. Stand firm, therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery. For you were called to freedom, brothers and sisters; only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for self-indulgence, but through love become slaves to one another. For the whole law is summed up in a single commandment, 'You shall love your neighbour as yourself.' If, however, you bite and devour one another, take care that you are not consumed by one another. Live by the Spirit, I say, and do not gratify the desires of the flesh. For what the flesh desires is opposed to the Spirit, and what the Spirit desires is opposed to the flesh; for these are opposed to each other, to prevent you from doing what you want. But if you are led by the Spirit, you are not subject to the law. Now the works of the flesh are obvious: fornication, impurity, licentiousness, idolatry, sorcery, enmities, strife, jealousy, anger, quarrels, dissensions, factions, envy, drunkenness, carousing,

and things like these. I am warning you, as I warned you before: those who do such things will not inherit the kingdom of God. By contrast, the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against such things. And those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. If we live by the Spirit, let us also be guided by the Spirit.

**The Gospel Reading:** *Luke 9. 51-end*

When the days drew near for him to be taken up, Jesus set his face to go to Jerusalem. And he sent messengers ahead of him. On their way they entered a village of the Samaritans to make ready for him; but they did not receive him, because his face was set towards Jerusalem. When his disciples James and John saw it, they said, 'Lord, do you want us to command fire to come down from heaven and consume them?' But he turned and rebuked them. Then they went on to another village. As they were going along the road, someone said to Jesus, 'I will follow you wherever you go.' And Jesus said to him, 'Foxes have holes, and birds of the air have nests; but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head.' To another he said, 'Follow me.' But he said, 'Lord, first let me go and bury my father.' But Jesus said to him, 'Let the dead bury their own dead; but as for you, go and proclaim the kingdom of God.' Another said, 'I will follow you, Lord; but let me first say farewell to those at my home.' Jesus said to him, 'No one who puts a hand to the plough and looks back is fit for the kingdom of God.'
