Mothers' Union Report:

Members of the Mothers' Union met on Tuesday afternoon and our first challenge was a Quiz - "Women in the Bible" set by our speaker, Mrs Alison Gregory. We must congratulate Glennis, who impressed us all with her knowledge of the Old Testament!

Alison then gave a most interesting talk, based on 5 women and a little girl, some of the heroines to be found in the Old Testament, all women of great courage and Alison compared them with heroines of the French Resistance in WW2. Shiprah and Puah were midwives from Israel, practising in Egypt who were ordered to kill all Israeli boys at birth and they were clever enough to disobey this edict by saying that Israeli mothers delivered babies by themselves, without the assistance of a midwife. This leads us to the story of Moses in the bullrushes. Naomi was a woman living in a foreign land because of the famine in Bethlehem. She sadly lost her two sons and her husband but had 2 daughters in law, Ruth and Orpah. She urged them to return to their families, but Ruth begged Naomi to let her stay with her and take the dangerous journey back to Bethlehem. Ruth worked in the cornfields, gleaning and there met Boaz, a relative of Naomi. They married and had a son, who became an ancestor of David. Naomi and Ruth were women who showed love, loyalty and quiet courage and of course one could admire Naomi as being an ideal mother-in-law! We were then told the story of Esther, a beautiful young Jewish girl who, after being coerced into entering a beauty contest, became the wife of King Xerxes. Her guardian, Mordecai, saved the King's life because he told him of an assassination plot. After these events the king honoured Haman (we all had to hiss and boo this villain of the plot), elevating him by giving him a seat of honour higher than all the other nobles. Mordecai refused to honour him and Haman got his revenge by plotting to kill all the Jews. Esther was brave enough to inform the king - it was unlawful for a queen to speak to her husband in this way - and thus the Jews were saved. Alison gave us Edmund Burke's famous quotation "The only thing necessary for the triumph of evil is for good men to do nothing". The last story was of Naaman's little slave girl who played an important part in curing him of leprosy.

These were women of courage and resourcefulness, a good role model for all of us, and Alison's stories gave us much food for thought Ann Nicholls

The Readings at 8am and 10.30am:

First Reading: 1 Corinthians 3.1-9

And so, brothers and sisters, I could not speak to you as spiritual people, but rather as people of the flesh, as infants in Christ. I fed you with milk, not solid food, for you were not ready for solid food. Even now you are still not ready, for you are still of the flesh. For as long as there is jealousy and quarrelling among you, are you not of the flesh, and behaving according to human inclinations? For when one says, 'I belong to Paul', and another, 'I belong to Apollos', are you not merely human? What then is Apollos? What is Paul? Servants through whom you came to believe, as the Lord assigned to each. I planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the growth. So neither the one

who plants nor the one who waters is anything, but only God who gives the growth. The one who plants and the one who waters have a common purpose, and each will receive wages according to the labour of each. For we are God's servants, working together; you are God's field, God's building.

The Gospel Reading: Matthew 5.21-37

'You have heard that it was said to those of ancient times, "You shall not murder"; and "whoever murders shall be liable to judgement." But I say to you that if you are angry with a brother or sister, you will be liable to judgement; and if you insult a brother or sister, you will be liable to the council; and if you say, "You fool", you will be liable to the hell of fire. So when you are offering your gift at the altar, if you remember that your brother or sister has something against you, leave your gift there before the altar and go; first be reconciled to your brother or sister, and then come and offer your gift. Come to terms quickly with your accuser while you are on the way to court with him, or your accuser may hand you over to the judge, and the judge to the guard, and you will be thrown into prison. Truly I tell you, you will never get out until you have paid the last penny.

'You have heard that it was said, "You shall not commit adultery." But I say to you that everyone who looks at a woman with lust has already committed adultery with her in his heart. If your right eye causes you to sin, tear it out and throw it away; it is better for you to lose one of your members than for your whole body to be thrown into hell. And if your right hand causes you to sin, cut it off and throw it away; it is better for you to lose one of your members than for your whole body to go into hell.

'It was also said, "Whoever divorces his wife, let him give her a certificate of divorce." But I say to you that anyone who divorces his wife, except on the ground of unchastity, causes her to commit adultery; and whoever marries a divorced woman commits adultery.

'Again, you have heard that it was said to those of ancient times, "You shall not swear falsely, but carry out the vows you have made to the Lord." But I say to you, Do not swear at all, either by heaven, for it is the throne of God, or by the earth, for it is his footstool, or by Jerusalem, for it is the city of the great King. And do not swear by your head, for you cannot make one hair white or black. Let your word be "Yes, Yes" or "No, No"; anything more than this comes from the evil one.

1 The kingdom of God is justice and joy, for Jesus restores what sin would destroy; God's power and glory in Jesus we know, and here and hereafter the kingdom shall grow.

3 The kingdom of God is challenge and choice, believe the good news, repent and rejoice! His love for us sinners brought Christ to his cross, our crisis of judgement for gain or for loss.
