A Derby based charity, **Padley**, was founded in 1985 to work with the most deprived and vulnerable people in our city.

The people we work with have a range of issues including;

- Homelessness
- Mental health issues
- Learning difficulties
- Drug or Alcohol addiction
- Long term unemployment

Our Homeless Centre is accessible 365 days of the year. Based in the heart of the city, the centre comprises a 12 bed hostel and a drop in centre, where our support workers provide professional support to help people move on in their lives. In addition, basic needs such as food, shower, clothing, laundry facilities and meaningful activities are provided along with the services of a visiting community psychiatric nurse, street drinkers clinic, drug users clinic, debt advisor, chiropodist, hairdresser and smoking cessation advisor.

The Development Centre is an accredited training unit delivering therapeutic and expressive arts, woodworking, cooking, cake baking, exercise and vocational skills to people with learning difficulties, mental health issues, physical disabilities and severe autism.

Our Padley Charity shop, catering and office facilities offer work experience opportunities to the long term unemployed and people with disabilities.

Each year some 40,000 visits are made to the two centres and although we receive a small amount of support from Derby City Council and the NHS, we are very dependent on donations and fund raising activities to enable our vital service provision to continue.

The Readings at 8am and 10.30am:

First Reading: *Romans 5.1-8*

Therefore, since we are justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have obtained access to this grace in which we stand; and we boast in our hope of sharing the glory of God. And not only that, but we also boast in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character

produces hope, and hope does not disappoint us, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us. For while we were still weak, at the right time Christ died for the ungodly. Indeed, rarely will anyone die for a righteous person – though perhaps for a good person someone might actually dare to die. But God proves his love for us in that while we still were sinners Christ died for us.

The Gospel Reading: *Matthew 9.35-10.8*

Then Jesus went about all the cities and villages, teaching in their synagogues, and proclaiming the good news of the kingdom, and curing every disease and every sickness. When he saw the crowds, he had compassion for them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, 'The harvest is plentiful, but the labourers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out labourers into his harvest.'

Then Jesus summoned his twelve disciples and gave them authority over unclean spirits, to cast them out, and to cure every disease and every sickness. These are the names of the twelve apostles: first, Simon, also known as Peter, and his brother Andrew; James son of Zebedee, and his brother John; Philip and Bartholomew; Thomas and Matthew the tax-collector; James son of Alphaeus, and Thaddaeus; 4Simon the Cananaean, and Judas Iscariot, the one who betrayed him.

These twelve Jesus sent out with the following instructions: 'Go nowhere among the Gentiles, and enter no town of the Samaritans, but go rather to the lost sheep of the house of Israel. As you go, proclaim the good news, "The kingdom of heaven has come near." Cure the sick, raise the dead, cleanse the lepers, cast out demons. You received without payment; give without payment.

who trod faith's road before us, and trod it to the end.


